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## **REAPS Executive Director Celebrates 30 years!**

Terri McClymont completing her BSc at Lakehead University, submitted a resume before leaving Ontario to REAPS for the Garden Educator position. She landed the position and started with REAPS on May 5, 1995, at the REAPS Compost Demonstration Garden, located in what is now Lheidli T'enneh Memorial Park. Sally Dabb and REAPS volunteers/board had initially built the garden, and a year later, the responsibilities were handed over to Terri. Over the years, this garden had grown into an award-winning space, hosting numerous residents, school children, and visitors.

Terri developed many community outreach programs based on environmental education. These initiatives led to the creation of over 33 school programs that continue to be delivered today. Through her

dedication to the community and REAPS, the awareness of environmental issues has significantly increased. Programs covered various topics, including backyard composting, water conservation, food waste reduction, and the practice of the 3Rs (reduce, reuse, recycle). What started as a small non-profit group continues to gain recognition throughout the Regional District of Fraser-Fort George (RDFFG) and province.

REAPS continues to deliver various presentations and workshops aimed at promoting sustainable practices and environmental education. Through Terri's passion, REAPS participates in many stewardship reviews and conferences, and shares knowledge with other organizations, businesses, and non-profits.

One of the most difficult challenges faced was in 2022, when the search for a new location for the

educational garden began. After 28 years downtown, the relocation process became essential. In 2024, the efforts culminated in the establishment of the Growing Knowledge Community Compost Garden, a hub and educational space that will continue to serve the community by fostering environmental awareness and sustainable practices.

The new garden located on UNBC property on top of the plateau, features expanded facilities, including a larger composting area, a greenhouse, and soon to have a dedicated space for workshops and classes. As the second year of growing begins REAPS looks forward to it becoming a focal point for community events related to sustainability, hosting many workshops, plant sales, and eco-fairs. The garden also offers volunteer opportunities for residents to get involved in hands-on environmental stewardship and gardening.

Terri's vision and leadership have transformed REAPS into a vibrant community asset, inspiring future generations to adopt sustainable practices and care for the environment. Her work with REAPS has not only educated thousands but also created a lasting legacy of environmental stewardship in the region.



# Construction of Ancient Forest interpretive centre to begin this summer source: Rocky Mtn Goat

Plans for the Lheidli T'enneh First Nation's interpretive centre at the Ancient Forest/Chun T'oh Whudujut Provincial Park are coming to fruition. In March requests for proposals were released.

This space will be over 4,000 square feet and powered by solar energy and have accommodations for staff and visitors to rent. A local gift shops is also planned.

Construction on the building and a new board walk will begin this May with a completion set for end of 2027. The construction will not interfere with visitors accessing the park.

## **Tomato & Pepper Plant Sale**

Saturday, May 3rd 8:30am to 2:00pm Indoors at the Prince George Farmers Market 1310 3rd Avenue, Prince George

Over 50 varieties of TOMATO PLANTS. You will have a choice of red, pink, orange, yellow, purple, chocolate or black fruited tomatoes. Sizes and shapes vary from currant, cherry, pear, plum and beefsteak varieties with tiny to monster fruit weighing over 500g. There will also be dwarf, patio and hanging varieties for those that have little gardening space.

## 19K litres of diesel spilled near Valemount source: Rocky Mtn Goat

A fuel truck carrying approx.19,000 litres of diesel was involved in a motor vehicle accident on March 21st south of Valemount.

Environmental Emergency Response Officers accessed the site. The transport truck and both of its tank trailers were damaged due to the incident. Diesel was found spilled from rear tank trailer only.

A remediation plan is in the works according to the Ministry of Environment and Parks.

# Normal volume of spring runoff forecasted for Upper Fraser East Area

The upper Fraser area from Valemount to Prince George saw a slight drop in snowpack levels this February and in March the region sat at 81% of normal snowpack load and currently at 75%.

# RECYCLE CRAFT CORNER Recycled Bird Feeder

Using recycled items for bird feeders is beneficial because it promotes environmental stewardship by reducing waste and reusing materials that would otherwise end up in land-fills. Additionally, some recycled materials, like certain plastics, can be durable and easy to clean, potentially leading to healthier feed-

potentially leading to healthier feeders for birds.

Search your recycle bins and find items (tin cans, milk jugs, milk cartons, pop bottles etc.) and create your own backyard bird feeder and get your binoculars ready!
